What You Should Bring:

Equipment

- Day pack (for deer hunters, it needs to be pretty sizable in case you cannot drag your deer to the beach and have to quarter it and pack it out with the cape and horns. In Alaska you are required by law to bring back all of the meat from your kill.)
- Sharp hunting knife(s) – you will be field dressing your own deer and if you are a long way from the pick up point you will want to quarter the deer and bone it out.
- Rifle (deer) and/or shotgun (duck). Please note that most airlines require a locked hard-sided case.)
- Scope Cover (another good idea is to care a roll of black electrical tape and tape the end of your barrel to keep mud out if you fall).
- Ammunition (1 box of rifle shells for deer hunters. For duck hunting, 2+ boxes of shotguns shells – check with us before you leave as we may have shotgun shells available for sale in camp). Please note that most airlines require that ammunition be in your checked baggage, in its original box, and NOT in your gun case.
- Binoculars
- Flashlight
- Ear Plugs or ear protection

Miscellaneous/Optional

- • Toiletries
- • Matches or Lighter
- • Several packs of pocket-size tissue for your day pack
- • Camera (photo and video)
- • Battery charger(s)

- • Extra memory cards
- reading materials
- • Garbage Bags for dirty clothes, boots, etc.
- • Gun oil & rag in a Ziplock bag

- • Soft Gun Case – to protect your gun from salt spray while traveling by boat to the hunting area.
- • Waterproof Gloves
- • Leatherman or Swiss Army Knife
- • Range Finder
- • Hand Warmers
- • Travel Pack of Baby Wipes for cleaning your hands after you have gunned your deer, etc.
- • Rope for dragging deer
- • Various Small to Medium Size Tupperware-like Containers (square or rectangular) can be useful for packing small loose items that otherwise might get lost in your cavernous duffel bag! They also come in handy for protecting fragile items you have packed and souvenirs on the way home that you do not want to get crushed.
- • Duct Tape
- • VHF Handheld Radio or similar

List of Gear for a Fishing Trip

- Spinning gear (If you fly fish, please bring your own equipment.)
- Rain Gear
- Waders and Hip Boots
- Fish processing and packing materials (vacuum seal bags, liners and wet-lock boxes)

What You Should Bring:

As you probably already know, weather in Alaska is unpredictable. No matter what time of year you come, weather can be unseasonably hot, cold, wet or dry! So prepare for the unexpected. Dressing in layers is imperative for comfort. That way you can add layers or take them off as necessary. With that in mind, here are some suggestions:

- A good rain suit (or you can borrow one of ours)
- Polar fleece pullover or hooded sweatshirt
- Medium weight jacket
- 2-3 base layer undershirts
- 3 shirts of varying weights that can likely be worn several times
- 3 pairs of pants
- 1-2 pair of long underwear
- One pair of socks for every day plus a couple of spares
- 2-3 pairs of boot socks if needed
- Gloves
- One waterproof day pack, which you can also use for a carry-on for the flight.
- Camp shoes – some sort of slip on short boots or moccasins that are easily put on and taken off are handy.
- One warm hat
- One baseball cap or similar

Miscellaneous/Optional:

- Toiletries
- Sunscreen
- Insect Repellent with Deet
- Camera
- Video camera
- Extra memory cards
- Battery charger(s)
- Reading materials
- Binoculars
- Polarized sun glasses

- A couple of garbage bags for dirty clothes and boots for the trip home
- Ziplock bags are handy to keep camera /video clean and dry as well as having other misc. uses
- Various small to medium size Tupperware-like containers (square or rectangular) can be useful for packing small loose items that otherwise might get lost in your cavernous duffel bag! They also come in handy for protecting fragile items you have packed and souvenirs on the way home that you do not want to get crushed.
- Duct tape packed in your carry-on can come in handy for emergency repairs and reinforcement to luggage, fish boxes, etc.
